I. INTRODUCTION

Shelby County Government (the “County”) on behalf of the Office of Early Childhood and Youth is seeking proposals from interested community based organizations to provide evidence based prevention programming and outreach services (the “Services”) for the Defending Childhood Initiative - Network for Overcoming Violence and Abuse – NOVA. This Request for Proposal (“RFP”) is being released to invite interested and qualified organizations or professionals to prepare and submit proposals in accordance with instructions provided where the successful candidate(s) will be selected and invited to enter into a contractual relationship with Shelby County for the Services outlined in this RFP. In this RFP, the terms proposer and provider are used interchangeably unless the context indicates otherwise.

II. MINIMUM PROPOSER REQUIREMENTS

All proposers must:

1. Have a minimum of five (5) years experience performing the Services described in the RFP.
2. Have sufficient, competent and skilled staff, with experience in performing the Services.
3. Have all appropriate licenses and certifications required in the State of Tennessee to perform the Services and procure all permits, pay all charges, taxes and fees.
4. **Apply** and **qualify** for a vendor number through the Purchasing Department and an Equal Opportunity Compliance (EOC) certification number through our EOC Administration Office **prior to submitting your response (MANDATORY, see details outlined below).**
5. Attest that you adhere to all Title VI requirements and provide proof/documentation if necessary.
6. Independent contractors (sole proprietors) must adhere to State of Tennessee Public Chapter No. 436, known as the “Tennessee Lawful Employment Act” (effective date of 01/01/12). **Proof and documentation of employment eligibility must be included with the proposal, if applicable.**
7. Provide proof of the minimum insurance requirements (**MANDATORY**, please review closely).
8. Applicant must be a community based non-profit organization or faith based institution, grassroots organization or school.
9. Applicants may apply in collaboration with other organizations, but must identify a lead agency.
10. Location of agency, services must be in one of the Defending Childhood Initiative Network for Overcoming Violence and Abuse (NOVA) high need areas and in service to vulnerable populations.
11. Must have history and experience of working together to promote social change and working with youth and community at large in the project target zip codes located in Raleigh/Frayser – 38127, 38128 or Southeast Memphis – 38115, 38118, 38125, 38141.
12. Must demonstrate history of successful outreach and capacity to properly implement effective prevention, outreach and awareness activities.
13. Must be able to work with diverse populations.

IV. PROPOSAL SUBMISSION & DEADLINE

All proposals must be received at the address listed above no later than **4:00 p.m. (CST) on February 8, 2016**. Facsimile or electronically submitted (e-mailed) proposals will not be accepted since they do not contain original signatures. Postmarks will not be accepted in lieu of actual receipt. Late or incomplete proposals may not be opened and considered. Under no circumstances, regardless of weather conditions, transportation delays, or any other circumstance, will this deadline be extended.

V. PROPOSAL TIMELINE

Shelby County reserves the right to modify this timeline at any time. If the due date for proposals is changed, all prospective proposers shall be notified. The dates provided after the RFP closes are approximate and the County reserves the exclusive right to modify these dates in consultation with the successful Proposer.

The County may reproduce any of the proposer's proposal and supporting documents for internal use or for any other purpose required by law.

VI. PROPOSAL CONDITIONS

A. Contingencies

This RFP does not commit the County to award a contract. The County reserves the right to accept or reject any or all proposals if the County determines it is in the best interest of the County to do so. The County will notify all proposers, in writing, if the County rejects all proposals.

B. Modifications

The County reserves the right to issue addenda or amendments to this RFP.

C. Proposal Submission

To be considered, all proposals must be submitted in the manner set forth in this RFP. It is the proposer’s responsibility to ensure that its proposals arrive on or before the specified time.

D. Incurred Costs

This RFP does not commit the County to pay any costs incurred in the preparation of a proposal in response to this RFP and proposers agree that all costs incurred in developing this RFP are the proposer’s responsibility.

E. Final Authority

The final authority to award a contract rests solely with the Shelby County Purchasing Department.

F. Proposal Validity

Proposals submitted hereunder will be firm for at least ninety (90) calendar days from the due date unless otherwise qualified.

G. Disclosure of Proposal Contents

Provider understands and acknowledges that the County is a governmental entity subject to the laws of the State of Tennessee and that any reports, data or other information supplied to the County is subject to being disclosed as a public record in accordance with the laws of the State of Tennessee. All proposal information, including detailed price and cost information, will be held in confidence during the evaluation process and before the time of “Notice of Intent to Award” is issued. Thereafter, proposals will become public information. *All proposals and other materials submitted become the property of Shelby County Government.*

H. LOSB

The County encourages the utilization of locally-owned small businesses as sources of subcontract work. The County notifies all respondents that all firms and/or individuals shall comply with the regulations relative to nondiscrimination in federally assisted programs of the Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended.

LOCALLY OWNED SMALL BUSINESS PURCHASING PROGRAM RULES AND REGULATIONS:

- (i) The Administrator of Purchasing in conjunction with the Administrator of EOC shall identify certain goods and services required by the County to be

set aside for special purchasing procedures for locally owned small businesses.

(ii) Only certified locally owned small businesses will be allowed to submit competitive bids on the goods or services identified under paragraph (i) above.

(iii) The Administrator of Purchasing shall, in conjunction with the Administrator of EOC, annually review the Shelby County Capital Improvement Program to determine those projects with a construction cost of \$250,000 or more. Contracts amounting to at least ten (10%) of the construction costs of such project shall be awarded to locally owned small businesses as defined herein, except as set forth in sub-paragraph (vi) of this section, either as part of the conditions of the solicitation for general contractors bidding on these projects, or as separate bids issued by the County for subcontracts that may be assigned to general contractors.

(iv) After adhering to all other bidding and purchasing requirements of the County, not inconsistent with this part, if no bids are received from locally owned small businesses, then the County may solicit bids for the goods or services from all other sources.

(v) On all purchases and/or contracts entered into by the County, the Purchasing Administrator or his or her designee shall have the right to negotiate with any supplier of goods or services to the County for the inclusion of locally owned small business subcontractors and/or suppliers in the contract award.

(vi) Failure by a supplier or contractor to include locally owned small business sub-contractors or suppliers in its bid or contract may be grounds for rejection of said bid or contract unless the supplier or contractor can show documented evidence of good cause why none were included.

(vii) Any locally owned small business awarded a contract or purchase order under this section shall not sublet, subcontract or assign any work or services awarded to it without the prior written consent of the Mayor or the Purchasing Administrator.

(viii) As to those purchases below the requirement for a formal bid solicitation (currently, under \$15,000) and not included in the locally owned small business set aside, the Administrator of Purchasing shall determine if any locally owned small business offers that product or service. If so, at least one such eligible locally owned small business should be included in the vendors contacted for an opportunity to bid, and the Administrator of Purchasing may, at his discretion, designate in a purchase order the purchase of such goods and services from the identified locally owned small business.

(ix) In those situations where a locally owned small business as defined herein, engages in open competitive bidding for County contracts, the Administrator of Purchasing shall provide for a preference for the locally owned small business where responsibility and quality are equal. Said preferences shall not exceed five percent (5%) of the lowest possible bidder meeting specifications. The preference shall be applied on a sliding scale in the following manner:

- a. A preference of up to five percent (5%) shall be allowed for contracts up to \$500,000.00;
- b. A preference of up to three and one-half percent (3.5%) shall be allowed for contracts up to \$750,000.00;
- c. A preference of two and one-half percent (2.5%) shall be allowed for contracts up to \$1,000,000.00;
- d. A preference of two percent (2%) shall be allowed for contracts that exceed \$1,000,000.00.

(x) For construction contracts over \$2,000,000.00, the Administrator of Purchasing shall provide for a preference of two percent (2%) to general contractors meeting the requirements of Section 1, Subparagraph B, if fifty percent (50%) or more of the total work comprising the bid has been or will be awarded to certified locally owned small businesses. The fifty percent subcontracting threshold must be met prior to contract execution.

(xi) The Administrator of Purchasing may divide a single bid package for any purchase of goods and services into two or more smaller bid packages in any case that the Administrator of Purchasing reasonably believes that the smaller bid packages will result in a greater number of bids by locally owned small businesses.

(xii) The Administrator of Purchasing, upon approval of the County Mayor, may establish special insurance and bonding requirements for certified locally owned small businesses so long as they are not in conflict with the laws of the State of Tennessee.

(xiii) The Administrator of Purchasing, with the approval of the County Mayor, shall adopt and promulgate, and may from time to time, amend rules and regulations not inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance, governing the purchase of goods and services from locally owned small business concerns to effectuate and implement the Locally Owned Small Business Purchasing Program within the intent of this ordinance.

(xiv) The Administrator of EOC shall, in conjunction with the Administrator of Purchasing, provide a written quarterly report to the Mayor and Board of Commissioners which shall include a summary of the purchases selected for

this program, a listing of the contracts awarded to locally owned small businesses for the period, and the dollar amounts of each such contract, and the percentage which such contracts bear to the total amount of purchases for the period.

VII. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS AND INFORMATION

A. Background

The Shelby County Office of Early Childhood and Youth (SCOECY) will fund up to four community based organizations to implement an evidence based violence prevention program and/or Family Nurturing Program in their community. In addition, SCOECY will fund up to one community based organization to create or work with an existing Youth Advisory Council to focus on Children Exposed to Violence to represent the voice of children and youth on issues related to violence and trauma. This may include after school programs, grassroots community groups, faith based organizations, neighborhood organizations or other established nonprofit organizations currently working with children and families.

Organizations encouraged to apply are community based organizations in the Defending Childhood Initiative – Network for Overcoming Violence and Abuse (NOVA) project areas located in target zip codes in Raleigh/Frayser - 38127, 38128 or Southeast Memphis - 38115, 38118, 38125, 38141. A collaboration of organizations may apply but must identify a lead agency who will act as the fiscal manager for the funds.

The Shelby County Office of Early Childhood and Youth received a multi-million dollar grant from the United States Department of Justice to implement The Defending Childhood Initiative (locally referred to as the Network for Overcoming Violence and Abuse – NOVA). This initiative was launched by former United States Attorney General Eric Holder to address a national crisis: the exposure of America’s children to violence as victims and as witnesses. Since 2010, SCOECY has lead over 30 diverse agencies and organizations across all sectors in developing the Defending Childhood Initiative – NOVA plan. The system design builds on the momentum of other Operation Safe Communities initiatives: including a *Coordinated Community Response to Domestic Violence (CCRDV)* and the *Memphis Youth Violence Prevention Plan* completed as part of the U. S. Department of Justice (DOJ) Shelby County Office of Early Childhood and Youth – Defending Childhood Initiative National Forum on Youth Violence Prevention.

The goals of the Shelby County Defending Childhood Initiative (Network for Overcoming Violence and Abuse – NOVA):

1. Neighborhood stakeholders, including youth and families are mobilized to change community norms and partner to support reducing and mitigating the effects of children’s exposure to violence.

2. Children and families at risk for exposure to violence are served with trauma informed care resources that prevent exposure and promote resiliency.
3. Children exposed to violence are served through a coordinated continuum of effective service delivery encompassing prevention, intervention, treatment and response.
4. The Shelby County Defending Childhood place-based model is supported, replicated, and sustained through system change, policy reform, and organizational development.
5. Children and families at risk for exposure to violence are served by diverse trauma informed trained professionals and community stakeholders who make timely and appropriate identification and referrals of children to prevent exposure of violence and promote resiliency.

The Guiding Principles of NOVA:

1. Violence at home, schools, streets and the media must no longer be accepted as normal.
2. All children should be equipped with emotional and psychological resiliency to protect them against the effects of exposure to violence and trauma.
3. All child and youth-serving settings, including law enforcement and juvenile justice, should be equipped to identify exposure to violence and mobilized to access help.
4. Effective, coordinated and sustained resources for developing resiliency and mitigating the effects of exposure to violence must be available to all children and youth: a) support for parents and families *where they live*; b) in the absence of family support, other caring adults to support youth; c) providers delivering effective, culturally relevant services with adequate resources and accountability for results; and d) schools and neighborhoods that foster healthy environments for children and families.

Achieving these goals under the auspices of the guiding principles requires the transformation of both the community at large and child-serving systems by incorporating knowledge of the harmful effects of exposure to violence into action. NOVA is not a project, it is way of living and caring for children and families through trauma informed child caring systems. Coordinated prevention, outreach and awareness activities will be critical in making this paradigm shift.

The problem to be addressed is too few community based and coordinated prevention, outreach and awareness programs in neighborhoods or within populations that experience a high level of violence. Grassroots, community groups are needed to saturate specific neighborhoods or populations with targeted prevention and outreach activities and advocacy so that incidents of exposure to violence may be reduced.

B. Scope of Contract

The County wishes to engage in a contractual relationship with the best-qualified proposer selected through a competitive process that will work well with the County's personnel in the performance of the Services.

C. Project Time Frame

The initial contract term will begin immediately upon execution of the contract through June 30, 2016, with the option to renew for one (1) additional one-year period beginning July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017 with the same terms and conditions, satisfactory performance of all criteria, and subject to the availability of funds for the renewal period. The optional renewal period will be upon mutual written consent of both parties. The Provider must be prepared to begin immediately upon receipt of a Notice to Proceed.

D. Reservation of Rights

The County reserves the right, for any reason to accept or reject any one or more proposals, to negotiate the term and specifications for the services provided, to modify any part of the RFP, or to issue a new RFP.

The County may at any reasonable time, at its expense, make an audit of the Provider's books relative to the Accounts.

E. Selection Criteria

Each proposal response will be evaluated on the criteria outlined in the RFP document, see Section XI and XII. Each proposer should set out in its response to this RFP to clearly identify the qualifications of its company and each individual who will work on this project.

F. Additional Information and References

Any additional information that would be helpful to the County in evaluating a proposal, including a list of current and former clients with a similar profile to Shelby County, should be submitted. At least three (3) current, or former clients who have been terminated in the last five (5) years, should be included on this list.

VIII. AWARD OF CONTRACT

Multiple contracts will be awarded based on grants received by the Shelby County Office of Early Childhood and Youth. The selections will be based upon qualification criteria as deemed by the County and as determined by the selection committee and the County Mayor.

The contract awards will be made to the proposers whose proposal is determined to be best in terms of professional and technical completeness. The selection process may, however, include a request for additional information or an oral presentation to support the written proposal.

The proposers whose proposals do not meet the mandatory minimum requirements will be considered noncompliant. After evaluation of the proposals and selection of the successful proposer, all proposers will be notified in writing of the selected firm.

IX. PURPOSE / SCOPE OF WORK

The purpose of this RFP is to select the best-qualified proposer (hereinafter referred to as “Provider”) and award a County-approved contract for professional services to perform the Services as outlined in the RFP and to satisfactorily complete all activities associated with the Services.

The objectives are:

- To provide evidence based prevention to individuals likely to see a high level of violence because of their place of residence, or status within a vulnerable population.
- To saturate neighborhoods or target populations with outreach and advocacy activities strategically coordinated with the NOVA public education, awareness and engagement campaign.
- To identify one proposer to focus specifically on a Youth Advisory Council – to unite the voices of youth through a youth leadership council to raise community awareness while advocating for policy change to increase the protection of youth.

Scope of Work

Grantees will be awarded a contract to plan and implement an evidence based violence prevention program or a Family Nurturing Program with children/families in their community.

The Shelby County Office of Early Childhood and Youth will:

Award a contract to each grantee to plan and implement an evidence based violence prevention program such as Coaching Boys into Men (CBIM), a leadership program that equips athletic coaches with strategies, scenarios, and resources needed to build attitudes and behaviors among young male athletes that prevent relationship abuse or a Nurturing Parenting Program such a Adults and Children Together (ACT): ACT mobilizes communities and educates families to create safe, nurturing, healthy environments that protect children from violence and its negative consequences.

Provide access to training and/or support to grantees on violence prevention or Nurturing Parenting training.

Assist grantees in identifying space to conduct the training and outreach.

Ensure active, accurate, and consistent communication between the SCOECY and the grantees.

Connect grantees to the media/public relations vendor selected to develop and deliver violence prevention messages and information that will support grantee outreach activities

Grantees will:

- Identify the type of Violence Prevention Program/Services that the grantee proposes to implement. Examples include but are not limited to evidence based programs such as:
 - Prenatal Nurturing Program
 - Nurturing Parenting Programs
 - Coaching Boys to Men
 - Nurturing Program for Families in Recovery
 - Parents and Adolescents
- Participate in required training to prepare staff, volunteers to deliver the curriculum
- Work with NOVA to develop technical assistance and support plan for the planning and implementation of the program
- Identify one staff person to be the coordinator of the program. This person will be responsible for coordinating recruitment, the intake process for families, logistics (transportation, materials and space) for the program and completing evaluation materials. It is estimated that Coordinator will devote 5 to 7 hours per week during the planning/recruitment phase and during the implementation of the curriculum.
- Recruit at least 50 participants to participate in the Violence Prevention Program.
 - Conduct an intake process with each family, which includes the assessment. NOVA will work with programs individually to develop the intake process.
 - Conduct consistent outreach and follow up with families to support them to complete the curriculum. Connect families to other supportive resources in the NOVA network and community when needed.
- Implement Violence Prevention Program with fidelity to the model and training.
 - Plan for all logistics related to the program, including space, transportation, and materials. The space for the program must have separate rooms or sections for small groups. NOVA can assist in identifying space when needed.
 - Identify and support staff and volunteers to deliver the program. Staff and volunteers will need to devote 5 hours per week during the program to facilitate; this includes planning the session, delivering the session and debriefing.
 - Ensure that at least 50% of the clients/families graduate from the program.
- Complete intake forms, surveys and/or brief interviews for the evaluation of the program.

- Ensure sustainability of the project and present a plan for continuing activities after the conclusion of funding.

Grantees also will participate in NOVA project outreach activities. Grantees will:

- Assist with the broad Defending Childhood Initiative – Network for Overcoming Violence (NOVA) awareness campaign, to be designed by a separate, contracted media/communications firm.
- Participate in the campaign by assisting with the delivery of campaign elements that may be offered within that specific community for maximum effectiveness. For example, grantee may propose to host a fair or a community forum.
- Participate in the overall NOVA no wrong door service model. Grantee will increase their knowledge and understanding of a trauma informed care community by participation in NOVA Partner meetings and required trainings.
- As a result of an increased prevention and outreach focus on trauma and exposure to violence, staff working in grantee agencies will identify children in need of Nova services and will be expected to refer children exposed to violence into the NOVA network.
- Identify or develop a Shelby County Youth Advisory Council on Childhood Exposure to Violence (YAC) to represent the voice of DCI-NOVA targeted children and youth on issues related to violence and trauma.
- Appoint up to fifteen (15) Youth Advisory Council members to serve up to a one year term no later than one month after the project start date. Appointments may be recommended by local youth-servicing programs.
- Provide orientation and on-going training to the Youth Advisory Council to prepare and motivate them to establish Rules of Order, engage the community to actively participate in the project, and develop a work plan that will result in a final public presentation.
- Track the number of trainings, coaching sessions, projects, and all activities that the youth complete during their term on the council.
- Youth Advisory Council will present and publish an analysis of strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats regarding the local DCI-NOVA outcomes, including progress and gaps, SWOT analysis, and input solely based on youth perspectives, ideas, and concerns that link to violence.

X. CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS

The successful proposer will be expected to enter into a contract incorporating the following terms and conditions, and such additional terms and conditions standard to services of this type.

A. General Requirements

1. Control. All services by the Provider will be performed in a manner satisfactory to the County, and in accordance with the generally accepted business practices and procedures of the County.

2. Provider's Personnel. The Provider certifies that it presently has adequate qualified personnel to perform all services required under this Contract. All work under this Contract will be supervised by the Provider. The Provider further certifies that all of its employees assigned to serve the County have such knowledge and experience as required to perform the duties assigned to them. Any employee of the Provider who, in the opinion of the County, is incompetent, or whose conduct becomes detrimental to the work, shall immediately be removed from association with services under this Contract.

3. Independent Status. (a) Nothing in this Contract shall be deemed to represent that the Provider, or any of the Provider's employees or agents, are the agents, representatives, or employees of the County. The Provider will be an independent contractor over the details and means for performing its obligations under this Contract. Anything in this Contract which may appear to give County the right to direct the Provider as to the details of the performance of its obligations under this Contract or to exercise a measure of control over the Provider is solely for purposes of compliance with local, state and federal regulations and means that the Provider will follow the desires of the County only as to the intended results of the scope of this Contract.

(b) It is further expressly agreed and understood by the Provider that neither it nor its employees or agents are entitled to any benefits which normally accrue to employees of the County; that the Provider has been retained by the County to perform the services specified herein (not hired) and that the remuneration specified herein is considered fees for services performed (not wages) and that invoices submitted to the County by the Provider for services performed shall be on the Provider's letterhead.

4. Termination Or Abandonment. (a) It shall be cause for the immediate termination of this Contract if, after its execution, the County determines that either:

- (i) The Provider or any of its principals, partners or corporate officers, if a corporation, including the corporation itself, has plead nolo contendere, or has plead or been found guilty of a criminal violation, whether state or federal, involving, but not limited to, governmental sales or purchases, including but not limited to the rigging of bids, price fixing, or any other collusive and illegal activity pertaining to bidding and governmental contracting.
- (ii) The Provider has subcontracted, assigned, delegated, or transferred its rights, obligations or interests under this Contract without the County's consent or approval.

(iii) The Provider has filed bankruptcy, become insolvent or made an assignment for the benefit of creditors, or a receiver, or similar officer is appointed to take charge of all or part of Provider's assets.

(b) The County may terminate the Contract upon five (5) days written notice by the County or its authorized agent to the Provider for the Provider's failure to provide the services specified under this Contract.

(c) This Contract may be terminated by either party by giving thirty (30) days written notice to the other, before the effective date of termination. In the event of such termination, the Provider shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any satisfactory work performed as of the termination date; however, the Provider shall not be reimbursed for any anticipatory profits that have not been earned as of the date of termination.

(d) All work accomplished by the Provider prior to the date of such termination shall be recorded and tangible work documents shall be transferred to and become the sole property of the County prior to payment for services rendered.

(e) Notwithstanding the above, the Provider shall not be relieved of liability to the County for damages sustained by the County by virtue of any breach of the Contract by the Provider and the County may withhold any payments to the Provider for the purpose of setoff until such time as the exact amount of damages due the County from the Provider is determined.

5. Subcontracting, Assignment Or Transfer. Any subcontracting, assignment, delegation or transfer of all or part of the rights, responsibilities, or interest of either party to this Contract is prohibited unless by written consent of the other party. No subcontracting, assignment, delegation or transfer shall relieve the Provider from performance of its duties under this contract. The County shall not be responsible for the fulfillment of the Provider's obligations to its transferors or sub-contractors. Upon the request of the other party, the subcontracting, assigning, delegating or transferring party shall provide all documents evidencing the assignment.

6. Conflict Of Interest. The Provider covenants that it has no public or private interest, and will not acquire directly or indirectly any interest which would conflict in any manner with the performance of its services. The Provider warrants that no part of the total contract amount provided herein shall be paid directly or indirectly to any officer or employee of the County as wages, compensation, or gifts in exchange for acting as officer, agent, employee, sub-contractor to the Provider in connection with any work contemplated or performed relative to this Contract.

7. Covenant Against Contingent Fees. The Provider warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person other than a bona fide employee working solely for the Provider, to solicit or secure this Contract, and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the Provider any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or any other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Contract. For breach or violation of this warranty, the County will have the right to recover the full amount of such fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or other consideration.

8. Employment Of County Workers. The Provider will not engage on a full or part-time or other basis during the period of the Contract, any professional or technical personnel who are in the current employment of the County.

(b) Notwithstanding the foregoing, no prior County official or employee may be employed by or receive compensation, wages or benefits from the Provider for a period of one year from employment separation from the County if during the period of employment with the County the employee or official had any direct or indirect involvement with the Provider's services or operations provided to the County.

9. Arbitration. Any dispute concerning a question of fact in connection with the work not disposed of by agreement between the Provider and the County will be referred to the Shelby County Contract Administrator or his/her duly authorized representative, whose decision regarding same will be final.

10. General Compliance With Laws. (a) If required, the Provider shall certify that it is qualified and duly licensed to do business in the State of Tennessee and that it will take such action as, from time to time, may be necessary to remain so qualified and it shall obtain, at its expense, all licenses, permits, insurance, and governmental approvals, if any, necessary to the performance of its obligations under this Contract.

(b) The Provider is assumed to be familiar with and agrees that at all times it will observe and comply with all federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, and regulations in any manner affecting the conduct of the work. The preceding shall include, but is not limited to, compliance with all Equal Employment Opportunity laws, the Fair Labor Standards Act, Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) requirements, the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

(c) This Contract will be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Tennessee. By execution of this contract the Provider agrees that all actions, whether sounding in contract or in tort, relating to the validity, construction, interpretation and enforcement of this contract will be instituted and litigated in the courts of the State of Tennessee, located in Shelby County, Tennessee, and in no other. In accordance herewith, the parties to this contract submit to the jurisdiction of the courts of the State of Tennessee located in Shelby County, Tennessee.

11. Nondiscrimination. The Provider hereby agrees, warrants, and assures that no person shall be excluded from participation in, be denied benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the performance of this Contract or in the employment practices of the Provider on the grounds of handicap and/or disability, age, race, color, religion, sex, national origin, or any other classification protected by Federal, Tennessee State constitutional, or statutory law. The Provider shall upon request show proof of such nondiscrimination, and shall post in conspicuous places available to all employees and applicants notices of nondiscrimination.

12. Entire Agreement. This Contract contains the entire Contract of the parties and there are no other promises or conditions in any other Contract whether oral or written. This Contract supersedes any prior written or oral Contracts between the parties.

13. Amendment. This Contract may be modified or amended, only if the amendment is made in writing and is signed by both parties.

14. Severability. If any provision of this Contract is held to be unlawful, invalid or unenforceable under any present or future laws, such provision shall be fully severable; and this Contract shall then be construed and enforced as if such unlawful, invalid or unenforceable provision had not been a part hereof. The remaining provisions of this Contract shall remain in full force and effect and shall not be affected by such unlawful, invalid or unenforceable provision or by its severance here from. Furthermore, in lieu of such unlawful, invalid, or unenforceable provision, there shall be added automatically as a part of this Contract a provision as similar in terms to such unlawful, invalid or unenforceable provision as may be possible, and be legal, valid and enforceable.

15. No Waiver Of Contractual Right. No waiver of any term, condition, default, or breach of this Contract, or of any document executed pursuant hereto, shall be effective unless in writing and executed by the party making such waiver; and no such waiver shall operate as a waiver of either (a) such term, condition, default, or breach on any other occasion or (b) any other term, condition, default, or breach of this Contract or of such document. No delay or failure to enforce any provision in this Contract or in any document executed pursuant hereto shall operate as a waiver of such provision or any other provision herein or in any document related hereto. The enforcement by any party of any right or remedy it may have under this Contract or applicable law shall not be deemed an election of remedies or otherwise prevent such party from enforcement of one or more other remedies at any time.

16. Matters To Be Disregarded. The titles of the several sections, subsections, and paragraphs set forth in this contract are inserted for convenience of reference only and shall be disregarded in construing or interpreting any of the provisions of this Contract.

17. Subject To Funding. This Contract is subject to annual appropriations of funds by the Shelby County Government. In the event sufficient funds for this Contract are not appropriated by Shelby County Government for any of its fiscal period during the term hereof, then this Contract will be terminated. In the event of such termination, the Provider shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any satisfactory work performed as of the termination date.

18. Travel Expenses. All travel expenses payable under this Contract shall be in accordance with the County Travel Policy and Procedures. This includes advance written travel authorization, submission of travel claims, documentation requirements, and reimbursement rates. No travel advances will be made by the County.

19. Incorporation Of Other Documents. (a) The Provider shall provide services pursuant to this Contract in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth within the Shelby County Request for Proposals/Bids as well as the response of the Provider, thereto, all of which are maintained on file within the Shelby County Purchasing Department and incorporated herein by reference.

(b) It is understood and agreed between the parties that in the event of a variance between the terms and conditions of this Contract and any amendment thereto and the terms and conditions contained either within the Request for Proposals/Bids or the Response thereto, the terms and

conditions of this Contract as well as any amendment shall take precedence and control the relationship and understanding of the parties.

20. Contracting With Locally Owned Small Businesses. The Provider shall take affirmative action to utilize Locally Owned Small Businesses when possible as sources of supplies, equipment, construction and services.

21. Incorporation Of Whereas Clauses. The foregoing whereas clauses are hereby incorporated into this Contract and made a part hereof.

22. Waiver Of Proprietary Interest. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein or within any other document supplied to County by the Provider, Provider understands and acknowledges that County is a governmental entity subject to the laws of the State of Tennessee and that any reports, data or other information supplied to County by Provider due to services performed pursuant to this Contract is subject to being disclosed as a public record in accordance with the laws of the State of Tennessee.

23. Organization Status And Authority. (a) The Provider represents and warrants that it is a corporation, limited liability company, partnership, or other entity duly organized, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of the state of Tennessee; it has the power and authority to own its properties and assets and is duly qualified to carry on its business in every jurisdiction wherein such qualification is necessary.

(b) The execution, delivery and performance of this Contract by the Provider has been duly authorized by all requisite action and will not violate any provision of law, any order of any court or other agency of government, the organizational documents of the Provider, any provision of any indenture, agreement or other instrument to which the Provider is a party, or by which the Provider's respective properties or assets are bound, or be in conflict with, result in a breach of, or constitute (with due notice or lapse of time or both) a default under any such indenture, agreement or other instrument, or result in the creation or imposition of any lien, charge or encumbrance of any nature whatsoever upon any of the properties or assets.

24. Warranty. The Provider warrants to the County that all Services shall be performed in accordance with acceptable standards in the industry applicable to the Services. The Provider shall correct, at its sole cost and expense, any work reasonably deemed to be unsatisfactory by the County. The Provider warrants to the County that all Services shall be in strict compliance with the terms of this Contract, and all applicable governmental laws, rules and regulations.

25. Rights in Data. The County shall become the owner, and the Provider shall be required to grant to the County, or its successors, a perpetual, non-exclusive, non-transferable, royalty-free right, in the County's name, to use any deliverables provided by the Provider under this Contract, regardless of whether they are proprietary to the Provider or to any third parties.

B. Indemnification and Insurance Requirements

1. Responsibilities For Claims And Liabilities. (a) Provider shall indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless the County, and its elected officials, officers, employees, agents, assigns, and instrumentalities from and against any and all claims, liability, losses or damages—including but not limited to Title VII and 42 USC 1983 prohibited acts—arising out of or resulting from any conduct; whether actions or omissions; whether intentional, unintentional, or negligent; whether legal or illegal; or otherwise that occur in connection with or in breach of this Contract or in the performance of the duties hereunder, whether performed by the Provider its sub-contractors, agents, employees or assigns. This indemnification shall survive the termination or conclusion of this Contract.

(b) The Provider expressly understands and agrees that any insurance protection required by this Contract or otherwise provided by the Provider shall in no way limit the responsibility to indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless the County or its elected officials, officers, employees, agents, assigns, and instrumentalities as herein provided.

(c) The County has no obligation to provide legal counsel or defense to the Provider or its sub-contractors in the event that a suit, claim or action of any character is brought by any person not party to this Contract against the Provider as a result of or relating to obligations under this Contract.

(d) Except as expressly provided herein, the County has no obligation for the payment of any judgment or the settlement of any claims against the Provider as a result of or relating to obligations under this Contract.

(e) The Provider shall immediately notify the County, c/o Shelby County Government, Contracts Administration, 160 N. Main Street, 9th Floor, Suite 950, Memphis, TN 38103, of any claim or suit made or filed against the Provider or its sub-contractors regarding any matter resulting from or relating to the Provider's obligations under this Contract and will cooperate, assist and consult with the County in the defense or investigation thereof.

(f) The Provider shall immediately notify Shelby County Government, Contracts Administration, 160 N. Main Street, 9th Floor, Suite 950, Memphis, TN 38103, of cancellation or changes in any of the insurance coverage required.

2. Insurance Requirements. The Provider will provide evidence of the following insurance coverage.

The Provider shall maintain coverage with limits of no less than:

1. **Commercial General Liability Insurance** - \$1,000,000 limit per occurrence bodily injury and property damage/\$1,000,000 personal and advertising injury/\$2,000,000 General Aggregate/\$2,000,000 Products-Completed Operations Aggregate. Shelby County Government, its elected officials, appointees, employees and members of boards, agencies, and commissions shall be named as additional insured. The insurance shall include coverage for the following:

- a) Premises/Operations
- b) Products/Completed Operations
- c) Contractual

- d) Independent Contractors
 - e) Broad Form Property Damage, if applicable
 - f) Personal Injury and Advertising Liability
 - g) Assault & Battery
 - h) Sexual Abuse and Molestation
2. ***Business Automobile Liability Insurance*** – \$1,000,000 each accident for property damage and bodily injury. Shelby County Government, its elected officials, appointees, employees and members of boards, agencies, and commissions shall be named as additional insureds. Coverage is to be provided on all:
- a) Owned/Leased Autos
 - b) Non-owned Autos
 - c) Hired Autos
3. ***Workers Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance*** - Employers Liability Coverage is \$1,000,000 per accident. The Provider waives its right of subrogation against Shelby County for any and all workers' compensation claims.
4. ***Professional Liability – Errors & Omissions Insurance*** - \$1,000,000 per claim or occurrence/\$3,000,000 annual aggregate.

All policies will provide for 30 days written notice to Shelby County Government of cancellation of coverage provided. Ten (10) days notice applicable to non-payment of premium. If the insurer is not required by the policy terms and conditions to provide written notice of cancellation to Shelby County, the Provider will provide immediate notice to Shelby County and evidence of replacement coverage with no lapse.

All insurance policies maintained by the Provider shall provide that insurance as applying to Shelby County shall be primary and non-contributing irrespective of such insurance or self-insurance as Shelby County may maintain in its own name and on its own behalf.

Proposers are required to provide evidence of the above insurance coverage with their proposal and shall maintain said insurance during the entire Contract period as well as provide renewal Certificates of Insurance on each anniversary date. The certificate holder is to read:

C. Right to Monitor and Audit

Access To Records. During all phases of the work and services to be provided hereunder the Provider agrees to permit duly authorized agents and employees of the County, to enter the Provider's offices for the purpose of inspections, reviews and audits during normal working hours. Reviews may also be

accomplished at meetings that are arranged at mutually agreeable times and places. The Provider will maintain all books, documents, papers, accounting records, and other evidence pertaining to the fee paid under this Contract and make such materials available at their offices at all reasonable times during the period of this Contract and for three (3) years from the date of payment under this Contract for inspection by the County or by any other governmental entity or agency participating in the funding of this Contract, or any authorized agents thereof; copies of said records to be furnished if requested.

XI. PROPOSAL SUBMISSION

A. General

1. All interested and qualified proposers are invited to submit a proposal for consideration. Submission of a proposal indicates that the proposer has read and understands this entire RFP, including all attachments, exhibits, schedules, and addenda (as applicable) and all concerns regarding this RFP have been satisfied.
2. Proposals must be submitted in the format described below. Proposals are to be prepared in such a way as to provide a straightforward, concise description of capabilities to satisfy the requirements of this RFP. Expensive bindings, colored displays, promotional materials, etc. are neither necessary nor desired. Emphasis should be concentrated on conformance to the RFP instructions, responsiveness to the RFP requirements, and on completeness and clarity of content.
3. Proposals must be complete in all respects as required in this section. A proposal may not be considered if it is conditional or incomplete.
4. **Hard copy proposals must be received no later than 4:00 pm (CST) on Monday, February 8, 2016 in the Shelby County Government Purchasing Department, 160 N. Main Street, 9th Floor, Suite 900, Memphis, TN 38103.**
5. The proposer agrees to provide the County with any additional information it deems necessary to accurately determine their ability to perform the services proposed. Furthermore, submission of this proposal constitutes permission by this organization for the County to verify all information contained in the proposal. Failure to comply with any request for additional information may disqualify the organization from further consideration. Such additional information may include evidence of financial ability to perform.

B. Proposal Presentation

1. One (1) original (clearly identified as original) and five (5) copies of the proposal are required.

2. The package containing the original and copies must be sealed and marked with the proposer's name and **“CONFIDENTIAL – COMMUNITY BASED OUTREACH AND PREVENTION SERVICES, RFP #16-001-35”** with due date and time indicated.
3. Proposals must be typed. Erasures and “white-out” are not permitted. Mistakes may be crossed out, and corrections may be typed adjacent and initialed in ink by the person signing the proposal. Please identify all attachments, literature and samples, etc., with your firm name and our RFP number.
4. Proposals must be verified before submission as they cannot be withdrawn or corrected after the due date and time. The County will not be responsible for errors or omissions on the part of the proposers in preparing their proposals. A responsible officer or employee must sign the proposal. Tennessee sales tax shall not be included in the Provider's proposal.

C. PROPOSAL FORMAT

Response to this RFP must be in the form of a proposal package that must be submitted in the following format: **Please download the attachment to this document.** The Proposal Response Sheet (***required document***) **should be the first page of your written response.**

1. **Cover Page** – Submit on letterhead stationery, signed by a duly authorized officer, employee, or agent of the organization/firm.
2. **Comprehensive Response**
(This portion of the proposal must address each item listed below.)
 - a. *All requirements and services outlined in the RFP document specifically Section II – Minimum Requirements and Section IX – Purpose/Scope of Work must be addressed in your proposal response.*
 - b. Outline of how respondent can meet or exceed the minimum requirements.
 - c. Detail of how the respondent is qualified to provide the services required.
 - d. A detailed description of the approach for accomplishing the services (include a time schedule for completion of each element).
3. **Cost and Fees** (*Not Applicable*)

Multiple contracts will be awarded based on grants received by the Shelby County Office of Early Childhood and Youth.

4. **Experience of the Respondent.**

A sufficient description of the experience and knowledge base of the proposer to show the proposer's capabilities should be included in the proposal. At a minimum, the description of the experience and knowledge base of the proposer included in the proposal should include, but not necessarily be limited to, the following:

- a. A brief description of the history and mission of the proposer, including the proposer's background and mission statement, the length of time the proposer has been in business, a description of the proposer's organizational structure and a description of the proposer's customer make-up;
- b. A statement of how long the proposer has provided services similar to the Services requested herein;
- c. A general description of the proposer's experience and background in providing services similar to the Services requested herein; and
- d. Any other relevant information about the experience and knowledge base of the proposer which is deemed to be material.
- e. Resume of each employee engaged in the services, including the role of each and an overview of their previous experience with similar projects.

5. **References**

References of the proposer, including at least three (3) other clients for whom the proposer has provided services similar to the Services (with preference given to clients comparable to Shelby County Government) and, for each such reference, the business name, the identification of a contact person, the title of the contact person and a telephone number.

6. **Additional Information**

- a. A description of any other resources available to the proposer that will be useful in providing the Services.
- b. A description of the methods used by the proposer to measure the satisfaction of its clients.
- c. Any other relevant information about the capabilities of the proposer deemed to be material.

XII. PROPOSAL EVALUATION AND SELECTION

A. Evaluation Criteria Process

1. Initial Review – All proposals will be initially evaluated to determine if they meet the *mandatory* minimum requirements.
 - a. The proposal must be complete, in the required format, and be in compliance with all the requirements of the RFP.
 - b. Proposers must meet the Minimum Proposer Requirements outlined in Section II of this RFP.
2. Technical Review – Each proposal will be reviewed by a special Ad-Hoc Committee which may elect to schedule a personal presentation and interview with one or more of the proposers. The evaluation committee shall review the submitted proposals and score points as provided in the scoring guidelines. ***The total maximum points the proposer can receive is 100.***

Proposal applications meeting the above requirements will be reviewed and evaluated on the basis of the following criteria:

- Commitment to and prior history, experience with Violence Prevention and/or Nurturing Parenting Program and core principles. **(15 points)**
- Identification of need for the program in the grantee's community. **(10 points)**
- Capacity to recruit and support families to successfully complete the program. **(15 points)**
- Commitment and capacity to successfully plan and implement a Nurturing Parenting Program or Violence Prevention Program with fidelity. **(25 points)**
- Ability to conduct intakes and collect and report evaluation data. **(15 points)**
- Commitment to sustain the program and bring it into the organization's culture. **(10 points)**
- Relevance of budget to support planning and implementation of the program. **(10 points)**

EACH PROPOSAL WILL BE EVALUATED INDEPENDENT OF THE OTHER.

3. Oral Presentation.

Shelby County Government reserves the right to interview, or require an oral presentation from, any respondent for clarification of information set forth in the proposer's response. In this regard, at the discretion of the evaluation committee, some or all proposers who submit a proposal in response to this RFP may be asked to submit to an interview or give an oral presentation of their respective proposals to the evaluation committee. If so, this is not to be a presentation restating the proposal, but rather an in-depth analysis of certain qualifications of the proposer. The interview or oral presentation, if utilized, is intended to provide an opportunity for the proposer to clarify or elaborate on its qualifications without restating the proposal. The interview or oral presentation is to be a fact finding and explanation session only and is not to be used to negotiate any terms of the contract. If required, the time and location of such interview or oral presentation will be scheduled by the Administrator of Purchasing or his designee. Interviews and oral presentations are strictly an option of Shelby County Government or its evaluation committee and, consequently, may or may not be conducted. All travel expenses to and from the interview or oral presentation shall be the responsibility of the proposer. Selection will be based on determination of which proposal best meets the needs of the County and the requirements of this RFP.

B. Contract Award

Multiple contracts will be awarded based on a competitive selection of proposals received by the County and grants received by the Shelby County Office of Early Childhood and Youth. The selections will be based upon qualification criteria as deemed by the County and as determined by the selection committee and the County Mayor. The proposals submitted will be evaluated by the County. All decisions are made at the discretion of the County.

The contents of the proposal of the successful proposer will become contractual obligations and failure to accept these obligations in a contractual agreement may result in cancellation of the award.

The County reserves the right to negotiate any portions of the scope of work or utilize their own resources for such work.
